

BRIEF PROFILES OF THE JEWISH POPULATION IN NEW YORK'S CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICTS

**Based on data from UJA-Federation of New York's
Jewish Community Study of New York: 2011 with maps based on
Prime New York's voter files**

March 2014

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INTRODUCTION

New York is home to the world's largest and most diverse Jewish community outside of Israel. To help the Jewish community realize its aspirations and address community needs, every 10 years UJA-Federation conducts a comprehensive study of our local Jewish community. Three recently published volumes — *Jewish Community Study of New York: 2011 Comprehensive Report*, *Geographic Profile*, and *Special Report on Poverty* — provide rich information about the strengths and needs of the Jewish population in New York City, Long Island, and Westchester.

To help government officials better understand the character and needs of the Jewish community in New York overall, and their constituents in particular, we have developed brief profiles of the eight-county New York area's Jewish population by congressional districts, using data from the Jewish Community Study of New York: 2011. These profiles provide population estimates, the age distribution of people in Jewish households, household estimates of vulnerable populations, and a selection of indicators of diversity among Jewish households.

To further illustrate the relative concentration and dispersion of the Jewish population, there are maps of each district or cluster of districts, with information where available drawn from Prime New York's identification of voters with distinctive Jewish surnames.

ABOUT THE DATA

Brief Profiles of New York Congressional Districts

The data in each profile are from UJA-Federation's Jewish Community Study of New York: 2011, a comprehensive study of the Jewish population in the eight-county New York area (the five boroughs of New York City, and the suburban counties of Nassau, Suffolk, and Westchester). With 5,993 interviews — more than any other local or national Jewish community study — the findings and implications are vast.

The interviews were conducted from February 8, through July 10, 2011, with randomly selected Jewish households residing in the eight-county New York area. The study was conducted by Jewish Policy and Action Research (JPAR) on behalf of UJA-Federation. For reliable analysis of smaller geographic areas, we required a minimum of 90 interviews to have been conducted within an area. For areas with fewer interviews, only population estimates are provided. See www.ujafedny.org/geographic-profile-report for analysis by county and by primary areas of Jewish residence within each county, grouped by clusters of ZIP codes.

For this analysis by congressional districts, survey data on the geographic location of the respondent household was recoded based upon the 2013 U.S. Census TIGER/Line® Congressional Districts by Social Science Research Solutions (SSRS), a principal member of JPAR. Special thanks to Ron Miller of JPAR, David Pollock of JCRC, and Jennifer Rosenberg of UJA-Federation for their assistance with this effort.

Maps

The maps that follow each of the profiles show the 2013 congressional districts (downloaded from U.S. Census TIGER/Line® Congressional Districts 2013), and reflect relative concentrations of Jewish voters, based on data provided by Prime New York's computer scans of New York City voter rolls, and ethnic coding based on distinctive Jewish surnames. Prime New York is a prominent source of current data on registered voters.

The percentages reflected on the maps are calculated by dividing the number of identified Jewish and East European surnamed voters by the number of registered voters in every election district (i.e., voting machine). The use of distinctive names and ethnic name dictionaries is less reliable than studies based on randomly selected households because: 1) many Jews do not have distinctive Jewish names while some non-Jews do; and 2) the analysis is based on voters rather than persons or households. Nonetheless, the maps provide a useful approximation of where Jewish voters live and the basic contours of Jewish communities.

Nassau, Suffolk, and Westchester Counties do not make their voting district maps public, so these maps are only available for districts within New York City. Find more JCRC-NY information on Jewish demographics at www.jcrcny.org/demographics.

The estimate of the Jewish population is 6,735,830, approximately 2.18% of the total United States population. This estimate is consistent with the 6.7 million Jews reported in the 2013 Pew Research Center, *Portrait of Jewish Americans*, and almost the same as the estimate of the Jewish population of the United States in the forthcoming article on the Jewish population of the United States in *The American Jewish Yearbook*.

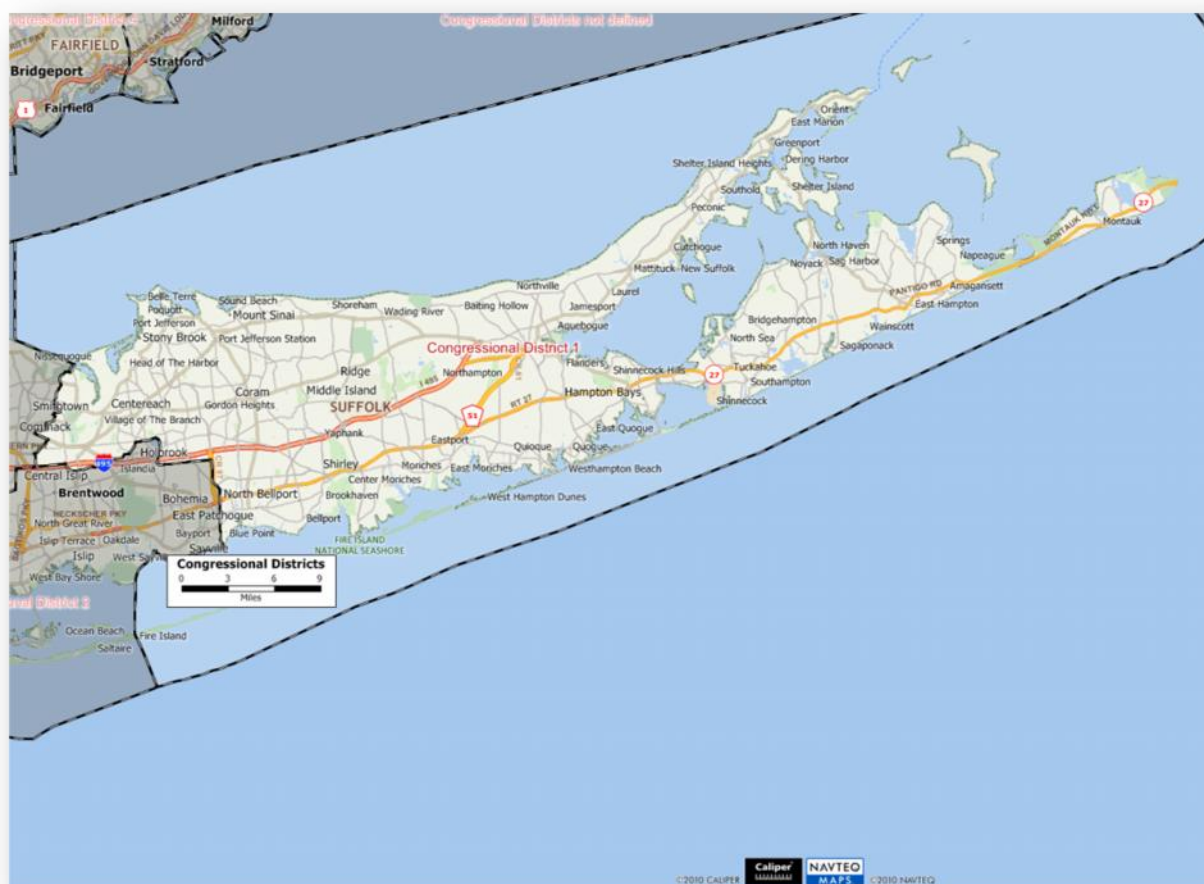

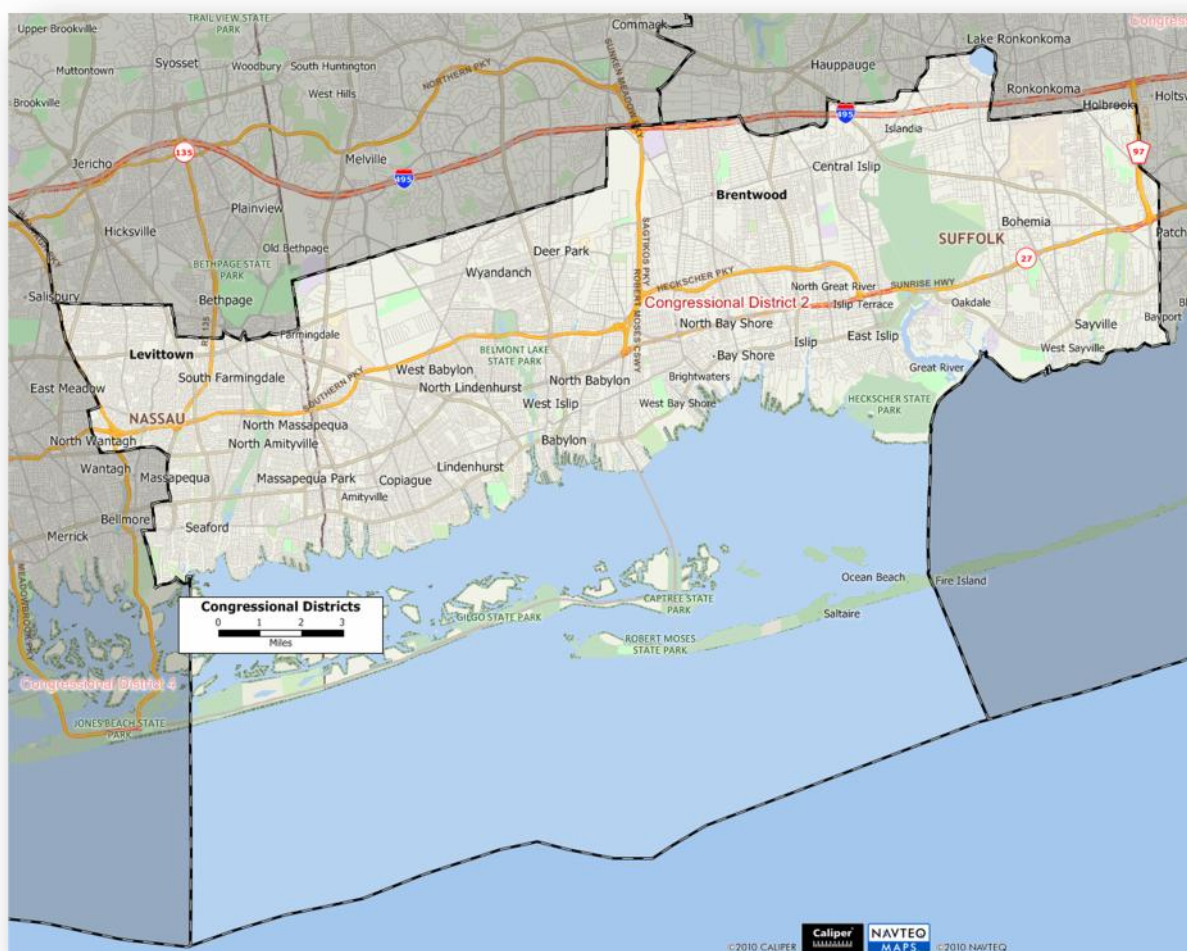

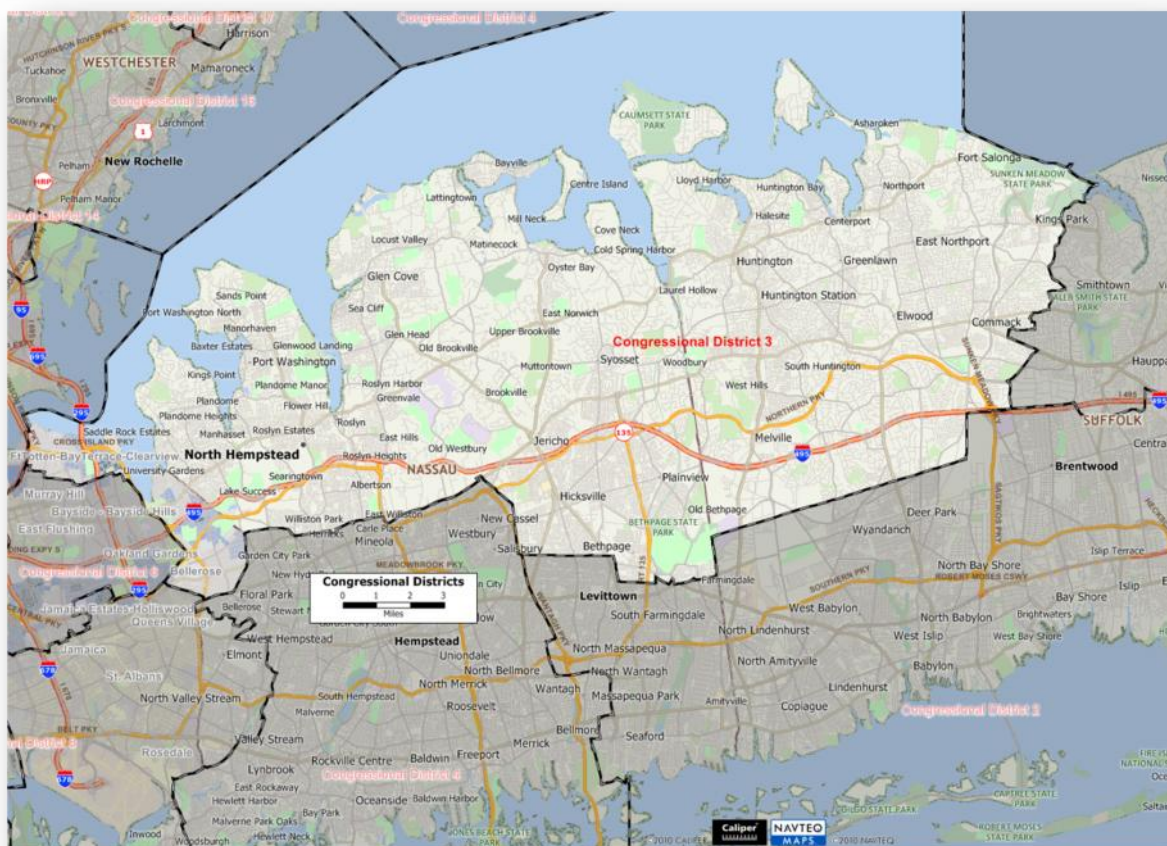

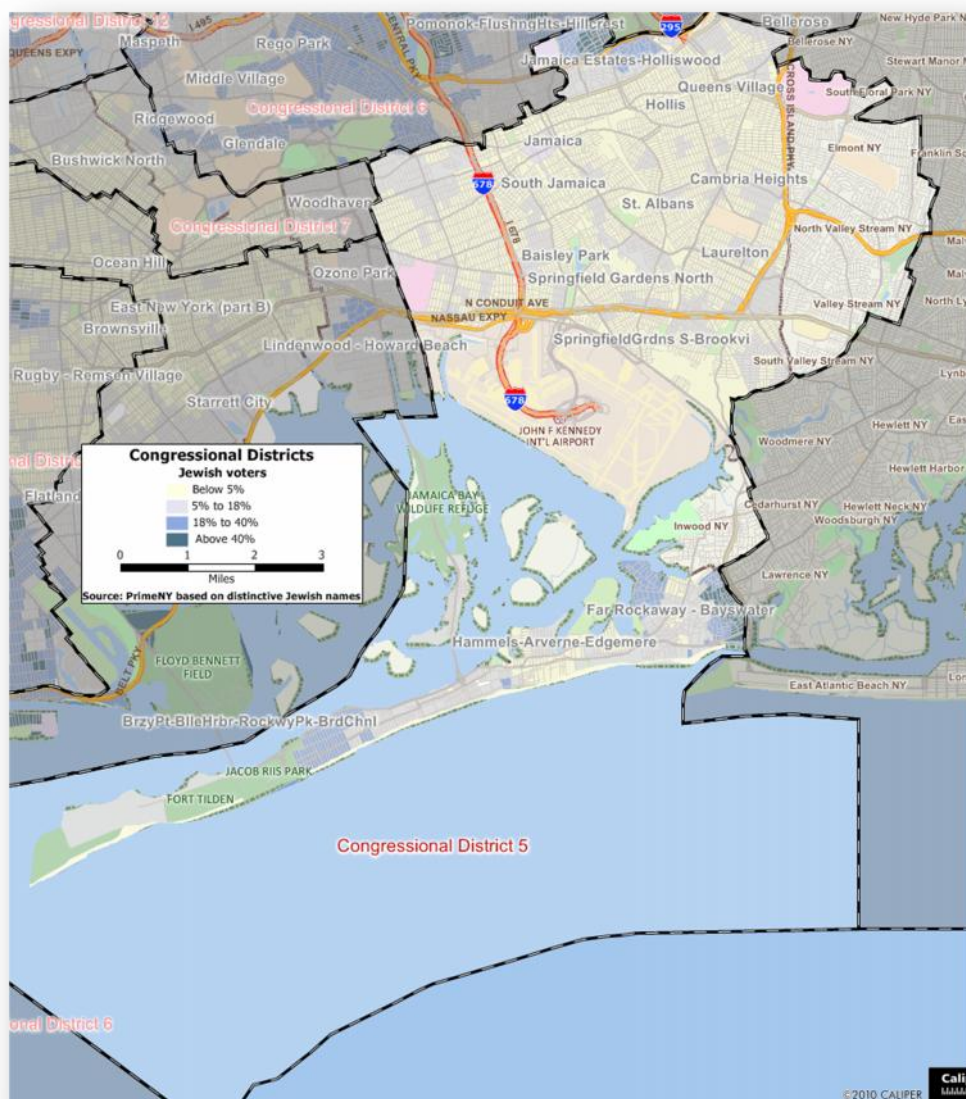

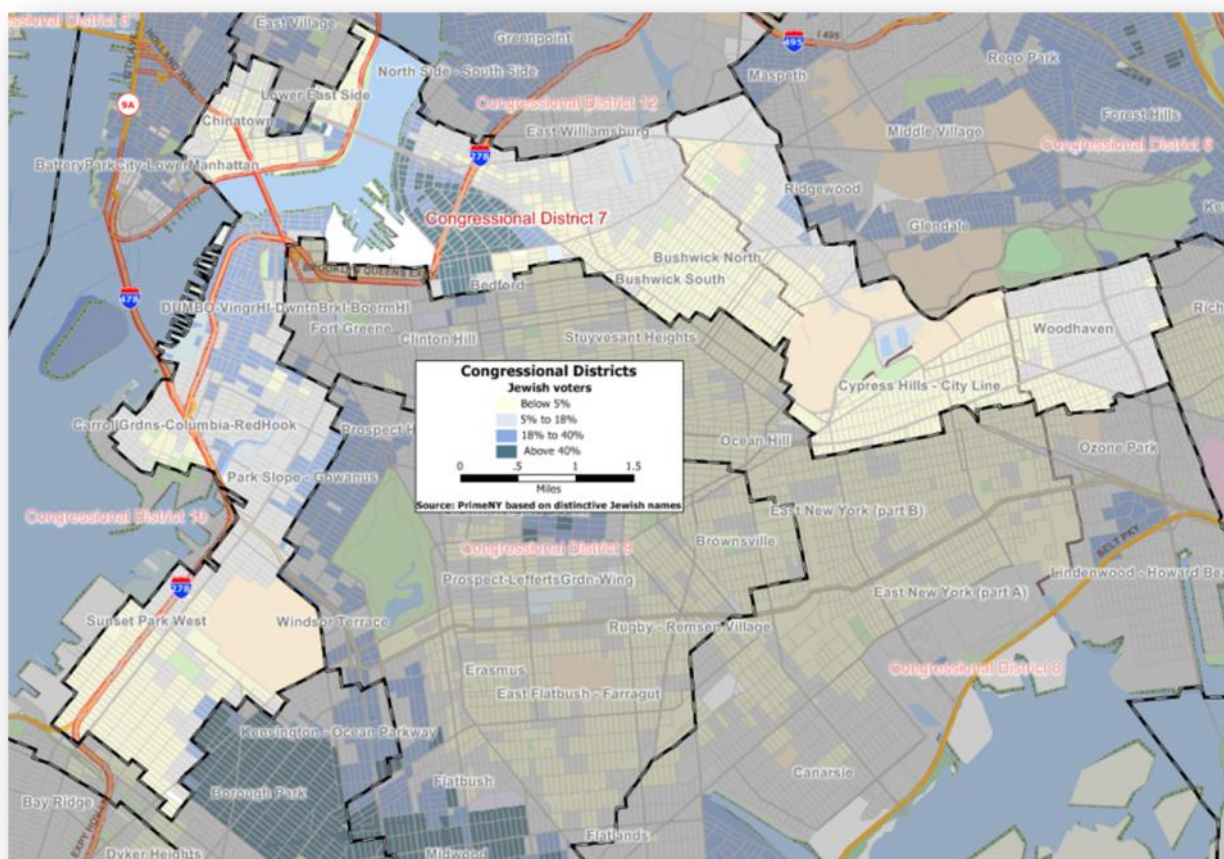

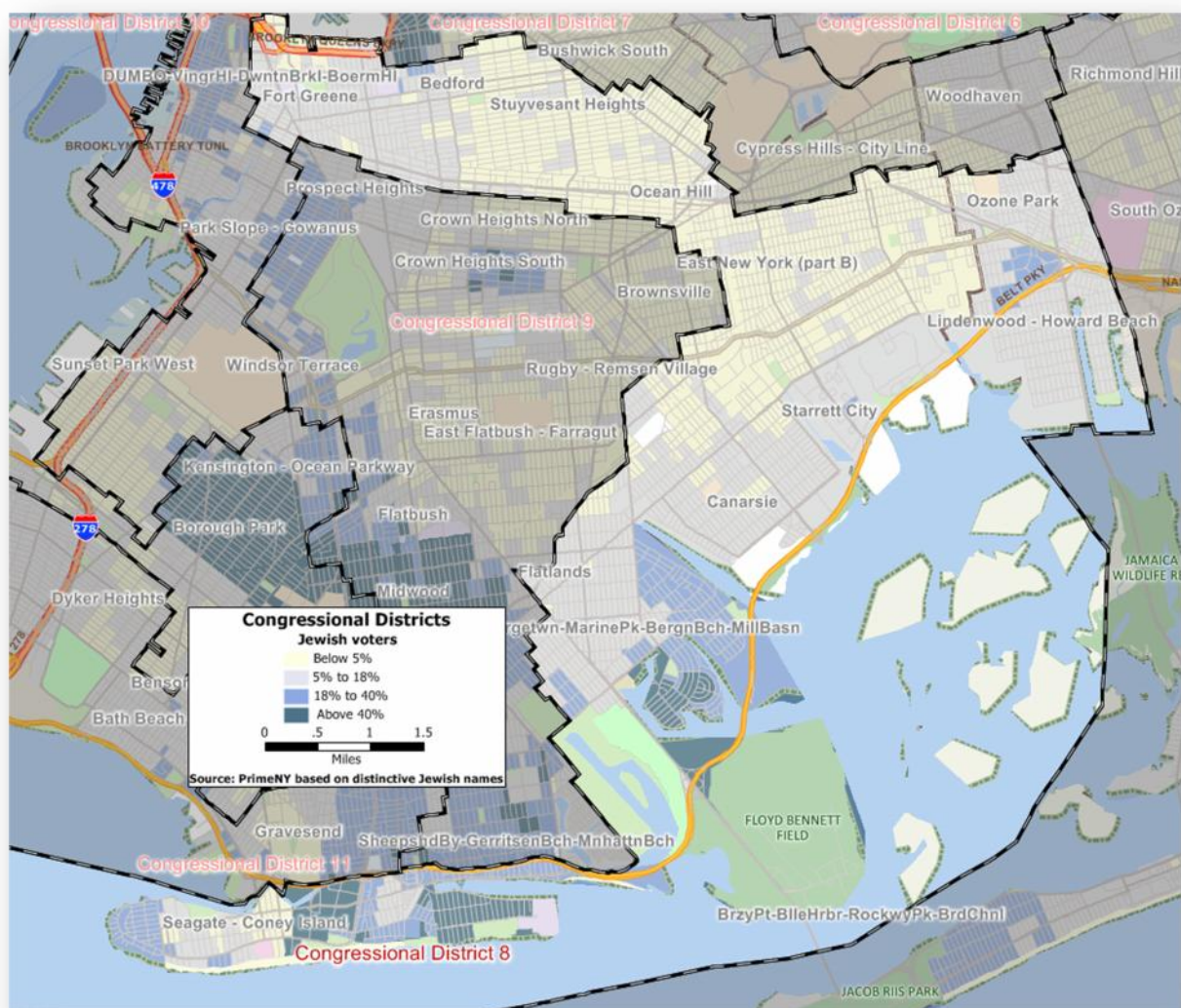

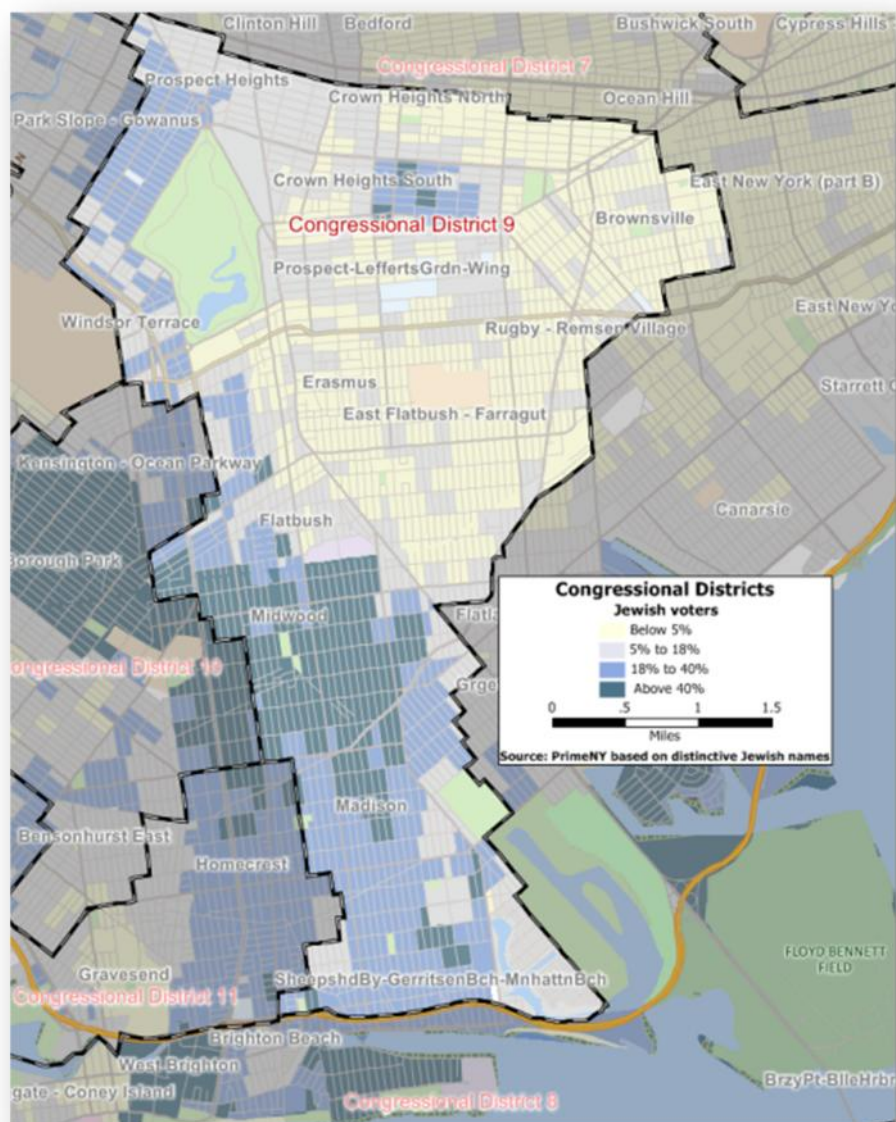

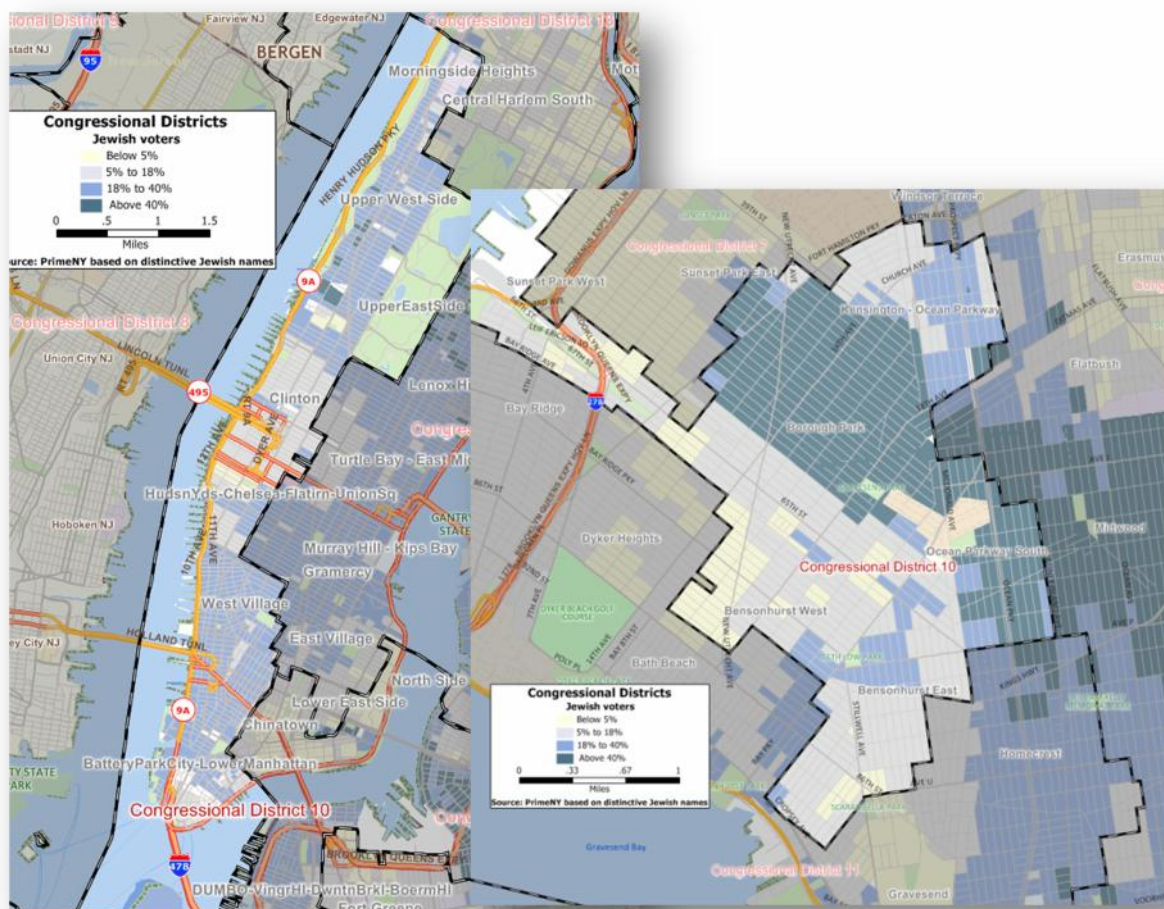

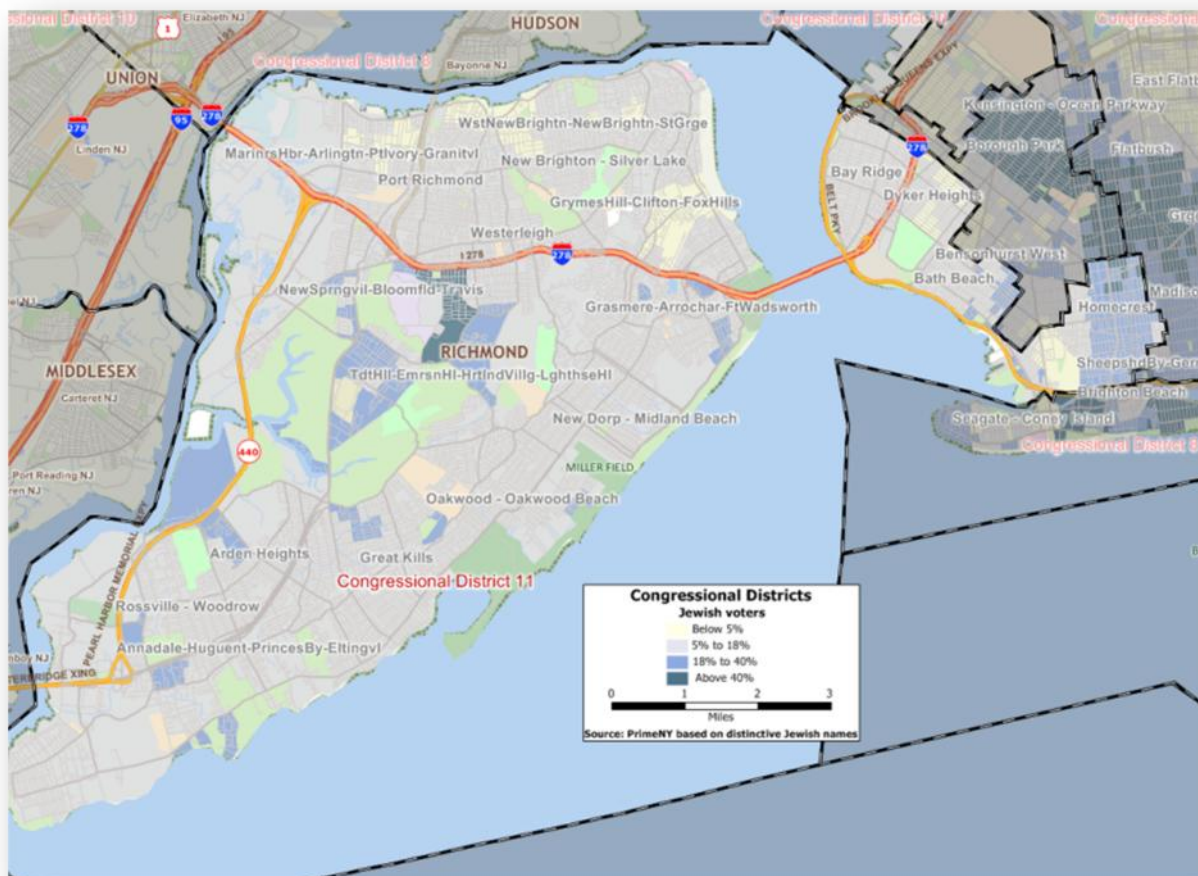

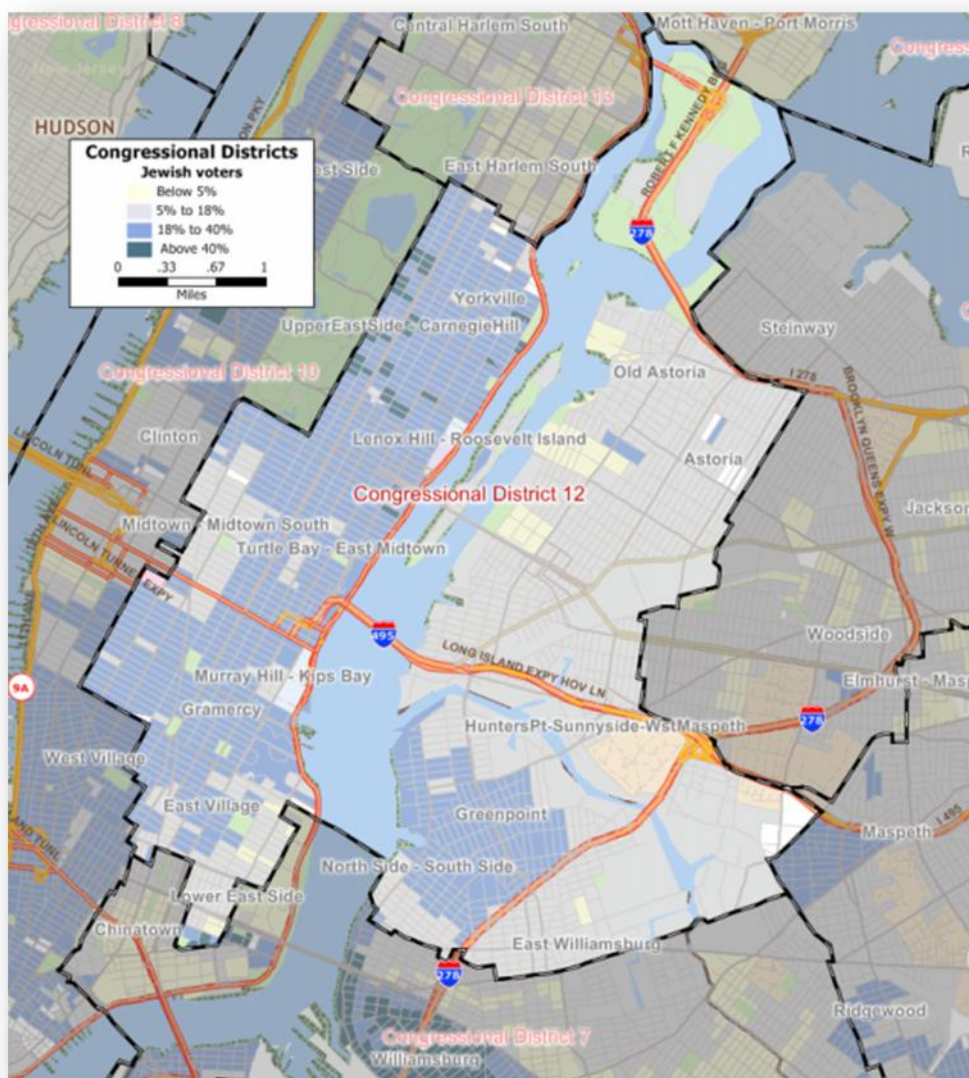

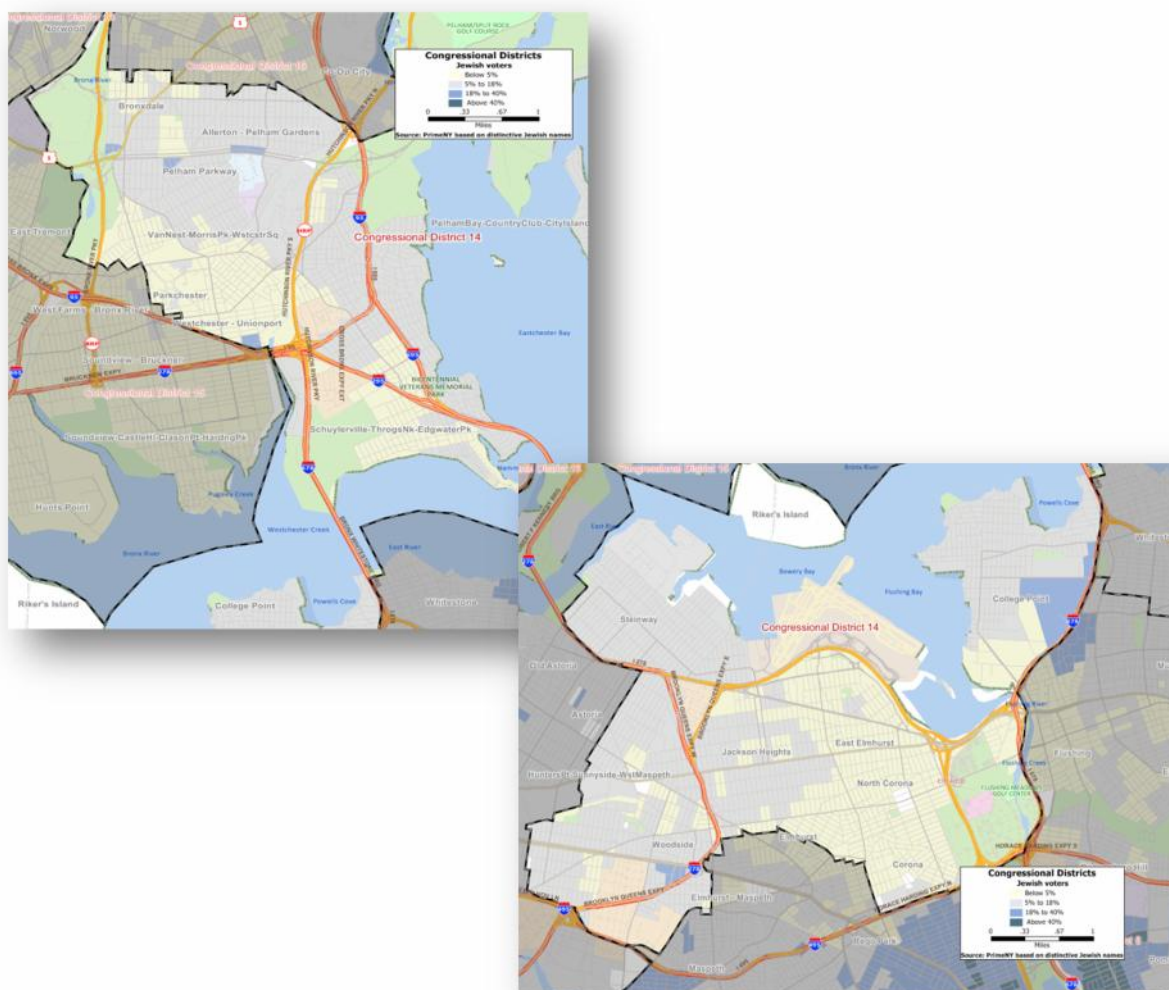

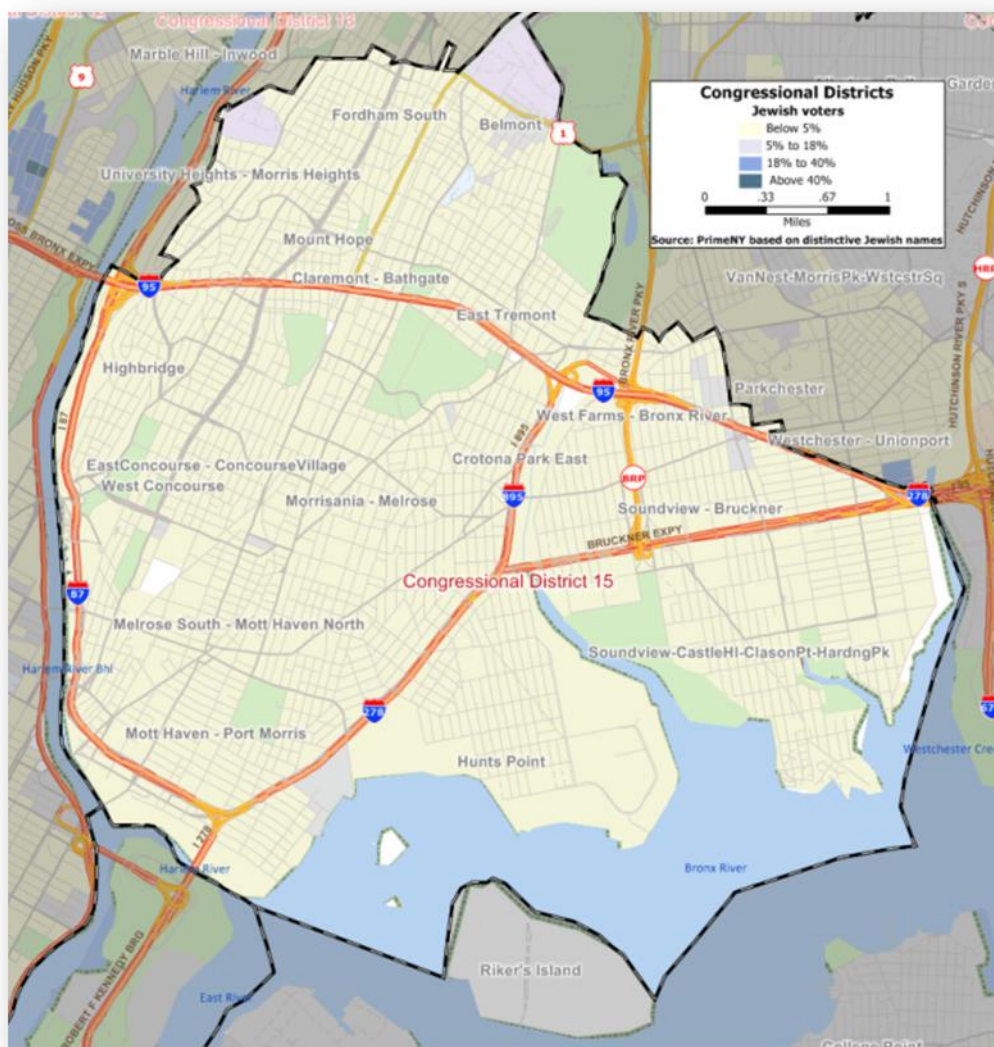

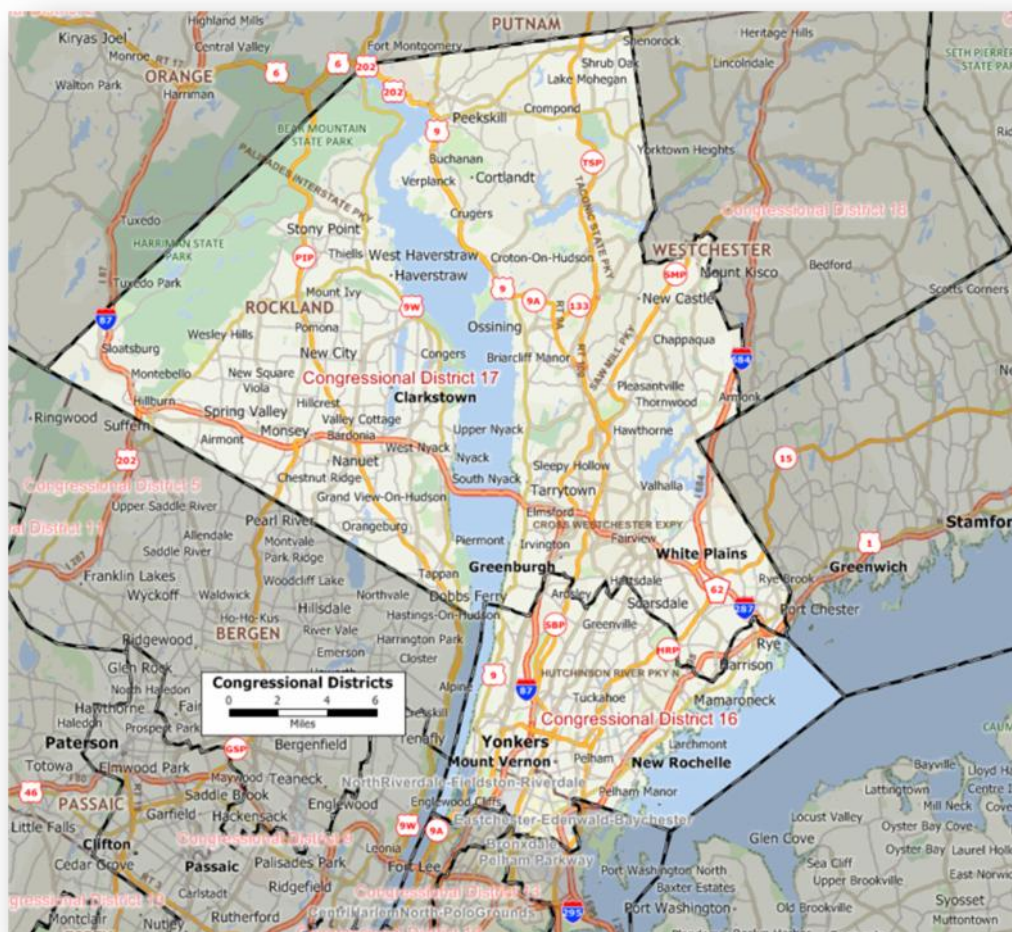
