

APPENDIX A

INTERVIEW SCHEDULE

Survey Research Program, Fall/Winter 1975.

The cover sheet was administered to any responsible adult in a selected housing unit. For those households including one or more Jewish adults, an objective selection among eligible adults was made and the selected adult was interviewed.

The questions asked in each instrument are reproduced below. When question numbers are skipped, they refer to items that constituted interviewer instructions that were not asked of the respondent.

Cover Sheet

It's very important that we find out where people are living, where they used to live, and why they moved. I'd like to ask you a few questions about this:
