Jewish Population in the United States, 1961*

In 1961 there were approximately 5,510,000 Jews in the United States. In 1960 we had estimated the Jewish population as being about 5,530,000 (AJYB, 1961 [Vol. 62], p. 63). The lowered estimate of the Jewish population of the United States is due primarily to a lowered estimate of the number of Jews in Greater New York City, based upon current data.

Our total figure was based upon estimates of local communities obtained in a manner consistent with past procedures (AJYB, 1961 [Vol. 62], p. 53):

1. A questionnaire was addressed to member communities of CJFWF. Responses were received from 120, and these were supplemented by answers from 34 member communities which had answered in 1960. As in 1960, a clearer indication was sought of the geographical area included in the individual estimates. Where such information was furnished, it is indicated (Appendix Table 1). 2. UJA estimates were used for member communities of CJFWF that did not respond and for nonmembers. 3. A revised estimate was made for New York City and Nassau, Suffolk, and Westchester counties.

Appendix Table 1 presents estimates for each city, by state, excluding for the sake of brevity those with a population of fewer than 100 Jews. Appendix Table 2 presents estimates for each of the 50 states, those for Alaska and Hawaii, the newest states, being less complete than the others. The state totals were derived by adding the city estimates in Appendix Table 1, estimates for communities with fewer than 100 Jews, and estimates of unknown Jewish populations (generally arbitrary figures, twice the total number of Jews in communities with fewer than 100 Jews.) The state figures were adjusted for city areas crossing state lines.

NEW YORK CITY AND SUBURBS

The estimates for New York City and suburban Nassau, Suffolk, and Westchester counties are vital because this area accounts for a minimum of 40 per cent of all Jews in the United States. The population figures given here

are based on 1960 estimates and bring up to date the data presented in AJYB, 1961 (Vol. 62), pp. 53-56, which were based on 1957 estimates for New York City and 1958 estimates for Nassau, Suffolk, and Westchester counties. Ratios of the Jewish population to the total non-Puerto Rican white population in each borough, developed from a 1952 Health Insurance Plan (HIP) sample study and adjusted to 1955, were applied to 1960 borough estimates of the white non-Puerto Rican populations to yield estimates of the Jewish populations. The ratio employed for Queens was adjusted upwards since in-migration, presumably from areas with a higher Jewish density, exceeded out-migration from that borough.

For each of the five boroughs, we arrived at an estimated absolute size of the Jewish population by way of an estimated ratio of Jews to the total non-Puerto Rican white population. For New York City as a whole, we arrived at an absolute figure by first adding the borough totals, and then computing the ratio.

It was more difficult to bring up to date the estimates of the Jewish populations of Nassau, Suffolk, and Westchester counties. For want of information, we had to assume that the ratio of Jewish to white in-migrants was the same as that of Jewish to non-Puerto Rican whites in New York City. Further, we assumed a natural rate of increase of 1.5 per cent per year for the total white population and for the Jewish population alike. (Erich Rosenthal [AJYB, 1961 (Vol. 62), pp. 3–27] has shown that comparable socioeconomic status lessens fertility differences between Jews and non-Jews.) Table 2 shows how the net Jewish in-migration to the three counties between September 1958 and April 1960 was estimated.

UNITED STATES

The individual community figures upon which the estimate for the United States as a whole is based represent the best data available at the time of writing. But the method used for arriving at the figure shown for a given community usually permits a substantial range of error. Even assuming that the summation of individual estimates will cancel some error, since the direction of error upwards or downwards can be expected to vary from one community to another, one should not compare the total United States figure for 1960 with figures for earlier years in any but a most general way.

A comparison of the AJYB estimate for 1957 with one resulting from a U.S. Census special inquiry of March 1957 (AJYB, 1959 [Vol. 60], pp. 3–12) supports the belief that the method here used yields a rough indication of the gross magnitude of the Jewish population and, to a somewhat lesser extent, of geographic distribution.
