What Did We Do

American adults told us how they're feeling and what they need in this moment of war

- Text-based survey
- October 29th-November 1st
- Jewish and non-Jewish
- Across the country
- Diverse community sizes
- All ages and stages



Survey Methodology

- Goal: Understand the sentiment and needs of American Adults, Jewish and non-Jewish, so that Federations & partners can better serve their local communities.
- JFNA Conducted a national survey in the US October 29th-November 1st
- SMS text-based study fielded by Benenson Strategy Group
- Random sample US Adults and Jewish Americans using Civis Analytics data set
- Sample stratified by the estimated number of Jews within 5 miles of a Zip Code to analyze differences by local Jewish population size and Civis' prediction of how likely someone was to be Jewish
- Responses Weighted to Represent American Jewish Adults & the general adult population
- Jewish Adults: 2199
- Total Respondents: 3777



Local Feelings



78% of Jews

say their local Jewish community is doing a good job addressing the ongoing war between Israel and Hamas.


30% of the American public agree

For both, the Jewish community gets the highest approval rating of 5 groups tested including local politicians, community leaders and religious leaders.



Perception of Leadership Response: Jewish

<u>Jewish respondents</u> report their <u>local Jewish community</u> is doing a good job responding to the war. They feel more negatively about the job of local politicians and community.




How well or poor of a job are the following doing in addressing the ongoing war between Israel and Hamas?





feel less safe than they did a few months before






Jewish Americans are concerned that the war will cause security issues in their local communities.

49% of the general public is likewise concerned.


How concerned are you that the war between Israel and Hamas will cause security and safety issues in your local community?






Wearing Distinctive Jewish Items

Jewish Americans are concerned for their personal safety, even more so when they are easily identified.



If yes to wearing a Jewish symbol, are you more worried about your personal safety...?




Jews who wore "distinctively Jewish" items were 2x as likely to report being concerned for their safety "all the time" as other Jews.








Jewish adults are seeing rising tension in their local communities.






Antisemitism on the rise

And compared with five years ago, do you think there is ...












Perceptions of Discrimination






Wearing Distinctive Jewish Items

Community members who "wear something distinctively Jewish such as a kippa (yarmulke) or a chain or bracelet with a Star of David or chai symbol" are more than twice as likely to report always being concerned for their safety right now.

In the past month, how often have you been worried about your personal safety because of your race, religion, gender, sexual orientation, disability status, or other defining personal characteristics?








Political Perceptions

How well or poor of a job are your local politicians doing in addressing the ongoing war between




United States Military Aid






Are emotionally impacted by the Israel-Hamas War

Both engaged and non-engaged Jews are emotionally impacted by the war.






Are personally connected to someone killed, hurt, displaced or captured in this War.



Donor Interests



Interest Areas

Three main areas of interest among the Jewish community are discussing antisemitism, Israel advocacy, and Interfaith/Intercultural conversations. They are much less interested in spirituality and socializing than in recent studies in non-crisis times.



Since the war between Israel and Hamas started, would you want more of any of the following opportunities in your community or area? Please select all that apply.






Increased Local Opportunities – All Americans



Perception of Leadership Response: All

Nearly 30% of adults indicate the Jewish community is doing a good job responding to the war, the highest of any measured group. They give local politicians the lowest ratings.
